MEDICAL SCHOOL SUPPORT



At Epsom, students are educated to prepare themselves for a bright future. Each student is given opportunities to get to know about the different pathways after GCSE and A-Levels through a series of presentations by staff or people from outside such as MABECS.

I am now in Y13 and have already gone through the medical school application process. I understand that applying to medical school is extremely challenging due to the amount of work you are required to do. That is why I have started a weekly application support session just for med school applicants. When I was in the process of applying, I struggled a lot because there were too many things that I did not know about. Now that I know pretty much everything a med school applicant needs to know, Bernice who has also applied to medical school and I are passing that information onto Y12 Future Doctors!

In the first week, I did a presentation on the overall application process to UK medical schools as most of the students are planning to apply to the UK. One session is of course not enough for them so next week will be about the extra-curricular activities they should get involved in. This session will be led by Bernice. The reason why extra-curricular activities are essential is that getting A*s is just not enough for Medicine!

To become a strong candidate, students should participate in super curricular activities such as wider reading, sample lectures, essay competitions, etc.

Besides, having work experience strengthens your application as it proves to medical schools that you are still committed to pursuing Medicine after taking time to learn about the realities of being a doctor. However, due to the restrictions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, it would be safer and more possible to have an e-working experience than an actual one. Great news is that Brighton and Sussex Medical School (BSMS) is providing a free virtual work experience where you can get to know the clinical education with plenty of videos and presentations slides.

Another important thing in the medical school application process is the admission test. Medical schools in the UK require either UCAT or BMAT (except for the University of Buckingham). These tests are used to identify the candidates' potential of becoming GOOD doctors. Most universities use the scores from these tests to shortlist applicants for interviews as the next stage of the application process. This may sound terrifying but no worries, Bernice and I will be giving you advice and sharing with you the tips on how to get high scores in the admission tests through a series of support sessions.




Research the subject requirements for your undergraduate studies before choosing your A-Level subjects and take subjects that you are strong at into consideration.

For the Biology category, our judge was Dr. Ann Minchin, a graduate from the University College Dublin with BSc Hons 1st class in Botany and Biochemistry and later a PhD in Plant Physiology. She, too, used to be a teacher of Science and Biology in the University of Reading and then Ysgol Penglais School. For the Chemistry category, we have Dr. Wardsworth-Reay, Head of the Chemistry Department at Epsom College UK who graduated from the University of York and is a MChem and PhD holder. Judge for the Physics category was our very own Mr. Matthew Brown, Headmaster of our school who has 27 years of teaching experience in Physics and was an examiner for a UK national exam board for over 15 years. The time and effort of the judges spent on the judging process was greatly appreciated.

After a rigorous judging process, due to the high quality and well-researched projects submitted, on 10th of February, we were proud to announce the results for the competition (attached below). ARMAN THE D YOUTUBER

Cadence: Hi Arman. I have just watched your new video - that's impressive! Could you share with us more about your journey as a Youtuber? Like when have you created a Youtube channel and what or who has inspired you to become a Youtuber?

Arman: Thank you for your Well. created support. ArmanFireRomano in May 2018 with my first video being about a farewell party of my high school teacher who was leaving to teach low-income students IGCSE in a boarding school. Vloggers such as David Dobrik and Logan Paul were the ones who inspired me to record my life and share it with the world.



Their viral videos and the technical management that happens behind the scenes interested me to create my own youtube channel and learn to generate entertaining content that people would enjoy watching. These YouTubers do have controversial moments in their career but they managed to handle the challenges and revert the situation which made me continue supporting them.



Cadence: I see. So do you post videos regularly? Like on a weekly basis?

Arman: Nope. I posted on a monthly basis during the first year. Some videos included family trip to South Korea а and mv experience joining a Halloween Carnival (Nights of Fright 7) in Sunway with my friends. In the second year, however, COVID-19 hit Malaysia and affected my uploads because I couldn't go out with my friends have serial experiences. and Nevertheless, I was still able to upload a few videos like High School Montages and a GoKart video where there was a clip of me drinking water from my shoe. It wasn't pleasant but I did it for entertainment. In the same year. I moved into a new college. Epsom College in Malaysia. I took a tenmonth break to get comfortable with my new environment but still managed to upload a vlog of me and my friends trying the first Taco Bell Fast Food in Malaysia. In terms of uploading, I don't post a lot as I value quality over quantity. I usually post random stuff on Instagram (@armanfireromano) because my Youtube channel is a place for me to store my precious memories.

Cadence: From what you have mentioned, I could see that you are an original content creator. I suppose producing original content for Youtube isn't an easy task. Do you ever feel like giving up?

Arman: Yea, of course, I did, but I am glad that I have my family and friends who have supported me since the beginning of my career as a part-time Youtuber and helped my channel grow.

Cadence: What about this time? I suppose making this "behind the scenes" video would definitely consume a lot of time to do filming and editing. Did the thought of giving up strike your mind halfway through your edits?

Arman: That's true. I have spent about three months creating "The Rise and Fall of Granville" by using only my mobile phone to edit it. I had to go through over three hours of content and edit it to a digestible content of half an hour. To be honest, I really wanted to give up halfway, especially the time when we all were going to have mocks in January. However, my friends were there for me. They motivated me and hoped that I could get the video published on Youtube. I just couldn't let them down and so here I am with my ECIM House Band Competition video!

Cadence: I am glad that you didn't call a halt to the video. It seemed like everyone, including teachers, loved it!

Arman: Yup, I was so grateful to the Epsom community - they are just amazingly supportive! You know what, I was actually quite anxious at first because I wasn't sure if people would be interested in this kind of video as it was longer than my previous uploads. Anyway, it turned out to be the top-rated video in my Youtube channel so far and it almost doubled in terms of views and likes compared to my former top-rated video. The number of subscribers to ArmanFireRomano increases too. The positive feedback and comments that I have received really made my day. I couldn't ask for a better fan base and community. At the end, everything was worth the effort.



Cadence: How exciting! It's good to hear that your Youtube channel grows with the support of the Epsom community. Your effort deserves all the kind words, Arman.

Arman: Thank you. Well, I am definitely proud of my achievement but I think I couldn't have done this without you all. I would like to seize this opportunity to give credit to my supportive friends including you, Ben, Paul, Cata, Wafi, Asheer, the Granville house and of course, the whole school. Because of you guys, I'm at the position I'm at right now.

Cadence: That's so lovely. It's my pleasure. By the way, I think many people will be curious about this - do you think you will become a full-time Youtuber after this?

Arman: Hmm, probably. I will consider becoming a full-time Youtuber but I would like to focus on my studies first because not many people have the opportunity that I currently have. If anyone would like to be a Youtuber, I would suggest that you should try it as a part-time job first, until you can generate the same amount of income as your existing job then only make the switch. I'm saying this because, at the end of the day, you still have living expenses to cover. That's also another thing that I would like to say to future Youtube creators: share your content with your family and friends and let them know how they can support your channel. This is how you can start growing the channel and have supporters.

Interested in helping at-risk youth? Hoping to help more women get access to free healthcare? Want to see what you can do to protect the environment at a local level? With the elections coming up, this may be the time for you to try on your political hat and see if that is an avenue worth exploring. Get involved in your community and see where it takes you.

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Save Money

College is expensive. Beyond the day-to-day living costs, students find themselves paying off debt for years. Instead of heading straight to school, consider a year of work to save up for this pricey academic adventure. We're not saying to set your eyes on your dream job, but starting off small will pay off in the near future when you do set out for school.

Hit up your favorite local shops and retail stores to see if they're hiring or ask around to see if people in your neighborhood need a long-term babysitter or tutor. The time after graduation may be the moment to take off with your vision — and with the support of a fellowship, you will have the financial backup, and often the mentorship, necessary to succeed.

Learn a Trade

University isn't the only place to further your education. Trade and vocational schools offer a unique opportunity to learn a valuable trade — for a fraction of the price in significantly less time. At the end of your program, you'll earn a certificate of completion and you'll be ready to get a career in your chosen field. This can be a substitute for university, or it can also be a way to get a better paying job while attending university after trade school. There are dozens of fields of study in fields including: graphic design, bridal consulting, cosmetology, surgical technology, personal training, massage therapy, dental hygiene and video game design.
